Conjunctions

Conjunctions are words that connect words or groups of words in a sentence.

• Coordinating conjunctions include the words and, but, or, or nor. They connect words, phrases, and sentences.

Monica and Lena are best friends.

They went to the mall and to the movies.

I thought it would snow, but it rained instead.

Louis will play third base, or he will pitch in tonight's game.

 Gorrelative conjunctions are pairs of words. The following are examples of correlative conjunctions:

either . . . or

neither . . . nor

not only . . . but also

both . . . and

Loaded with homework, I had <u>neither</u> the time <u>nor</u> the energy to play video games.

Tara is <u>not only</u> president of the student council <u>but also</u> secretary of the Spanish club.

 Subordinating conjunctions are words that begin adverb clauses. The following are examples of subordinating conjunctions:

after although as

as long as

if sinc though

whenever

as soon as because since so that unless

where

as if

before

then

until when wherever

while

As soon as the shower ends, we will finish the game.

While waiting for her brother, Danielle read her novel.

Ming didn't know where he had left his keys.
